CODE OF STUDENT CONDUCT

Updated 2018 Unabridged Version

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Introduction

In order to maximize educational opportunities for students, Bonneville Joint School District No. 93 has adopted this <u>Code of Student Conduct</u> to support the creation of a safe, positive learning environment for every student, employee, and school visitor. Effective learning in school requires discipline, which is defined as the absence of disturbances that interfere with the effective functioning of the school community and the presence of a friendly, business-like atmosphere where students and school personnel work cooperatively toward mutual goals. Every student has the right to learn and every teacher has the right to teach. Anything or anyone interfering with these rights should be corrected or removed from the school environment.

In addition to this Code, the Board of Trustees has adopted policies and procedures that govern conduct in the District. Policies are referenced herein and can be viewed www.d93schools.org by clicking on About D93 tab → Board of Trustees → Board Polices. Code of Student Conduct can be viewed under the Parent & Students tab. Copies of both policies and Code of Student Conduct can be printed from the website or obtained from any school office or the District Office at 3497 N. Ammon Road, Idaho Falls, Idaho.

Students and parents/guardians should review all information in the <u>Code of Student Conduct</u> carefully and discuss the consequences of violating the rules. When a student registers for school, either as a new student or a returning student, parents/guardians and students will acknowledge they have reviewed the <u>Code of Student Conduct</u> together. This acknowledgement is required for each student for each year the student attends school in District 93. This acknowledgement will indicate they have reviewed the <u>Code of Student Conduct</u> and are aware of the explanation of rules it provides.

Purpose of the Code of Conduct

This Code of Student Conduct is not comprehensive nor is it a contract between the District and students or their parents or guardians and may be amended at any time. The purpose is to assist students, teachers, and administrators in maintaining an environment conducive to learning. It establishes a zero-tolerance policy for conduct that may endanger the safety of students, staff, or the community and/or disrupts the educational experience for other students. The Code clearly states the District's standards for acceptable student conduct and explains the consequences for unacceptable and serious misbehavior.

The Code of Student Conduct will:

- Describe the scope of the code, equal opportunity, language access, and reporting discrimination or harassment;
- 2. Describe the roles of parents/guardians, students, and school personnel regarding cooperation required to facilitate effective learning;
- 3. Describe student and parent/guardian rights and responsibilities regarding general information, student enrollment, consistent and timely attendance, counseling services, promotion or retention, grades and/or credit, appropriate dress and grooming, student driving and parking on school premises, free speech/expression and student publications, privacy of student records, privacy and property rights, search and seizure, use of technology, and student activities and assembly;
- 4. Describe the right to appeal including grievance procedures;

- 5. Describe disciplinary actions:
- 6. Describe the process for reporting discrimination or harassment;
- 7. Identify levels of offenses and how rule violations are labeled;
- 8. List the Code of Student Conduct rules.
- Identify and standardize procedures for administering formal disciplinary actions when violations occur; and
- 10. List pertinent definitions.

Scope of the Code

Although increasing age and maturity should lead to students assuming greater responsibility for their actions and may require different types of disciplinary action, the procedures identified in this <u>Code of</u> Student Conduct shall apply to all Bonneville Joint School District No. 93 students.¹

School officials may discipline students for misconduct as defined in this Code that occurs:

- 1. on school premises at any time;
- 2. during any school-sponsored activity, function, or event regardless of location;
- while being transported to and from school, including at bus stops; or to school sponsored events, field trips, or extracurricular or co-curricular activities on school buses or other conveyances at public expense; or
- 4. off school grounds whenever the conduct may reasonably be expected to:
 - a. undermine the proper disciplinary authority of District employees;
 - b. be detrimental to the health, safety, and/or welfare of the school community; or
 - c. disrupt the school environment.

Equal Opportunity Statement

Bonneville Joint School District No. 93 complies with all federal, state, and local laws, and provides an equal opportunity for all students. Discrimination in admission, grading, discipline, or any other activity based on race, creed, color, national origin, religion, ancestry, age, marital status, sexual orientation (known or perceived), gender identity expression (known or perceived), gender, handicap, nationality, or citizenship is prohibited.² All decisions will be administered without regard to any of these categories.

SECTION 1

COOPERATION REQUIRED TO FACILITATE EFFECTIVE LEARNING

Effective learning requires cooperation among parents or guardians, students, and educators.

1.1 COOPERATION IS FACILITATED BY PARENTS OR GUARDIANS WHO:

- 1.1.1. Communicate regularly with school personnel concerning their child's progress and conduct¹ including the use of the PowerSchool Parent Portal.2
- 1.1.2. Encourage their child's daily attendance and promptly report and explain an absence or tardiness to school authorities.3
- 1.1.3. Provide their child with resources needed to complete schoolwork.4
- 1.1.4. Assist their child to be healthy, neat, and clean.
- 1.1.5. Notify school personnel of any problem affecting their child or other students.⁵
- 1.1.6. Discuss report cards and work assignments with their child.6
- 1.1.7. Maintain up-to-date telephone numbers (home, work, and emergency) at the school, including doctor and hospital preferences, and emergency health care forms.7

- 1.3.7. Abide by and enforce the rules of the school and policies of the Board of Trustees.
- 1.3.8. Seek changes in and orderly, recognized manner.⁷
- 1.3.9. Use a variety of informal disciplinary and guidance methods prior to, during, and after formal disciplinary action, including:8
 - Conferences and/or contacts with administrators, students, parents or quardians, and teachers.
 - Student program adjustments.
 - Referral to counseling and/or special services for help deemed necessary.
 - Referral to appropriate outside agencies for specific concerns.

SECTION 2

RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES

Individual rights involve associated responsibilities, and are related to the health, safety, and welfare of the school community as a whole. Each school principal is responsible for managing his/her school, under the supervision of the Superintendent or his/her designee and pursuant to the policies of the Board of Trustees. All parents or guardians and students share with the administration and faculty responsibility to develop a safe learning environment. The administration, faculty, and staff shall assist in orderly operation of the school and help to assure rights of students and parents or guardians.

RIGHTS OF VICTIMS IN SCHOOL RELATED OFFENSES

Any victims have the right to:

- 2.1.24 Appear at a student's disciplinary hearing to testify to the facts of any Level 4 violation of this Code as it relates to the victim.
- 2.1.25 File a grievance pursuant to the District's policy #4112 Uniform Grievance or #4110 Public Complaints.
- 2.1.26 Pursue criminal charges through the Criminal Justice or Juvenile Court Systems. To do so, a victim may initiate charges with the Bonneville County Sheriff's Office or file a private criminal complaint.

2.2 STUDENT ENROLLMENT

Parents or guardians are obligated to abide by student entrance age, identification, and immunization requirements of Idaho State law.¹ A certified birth certificate and immunization records shall be required prior to student admission to any District school. Proof of residence may also be required.

2.3 ATTENDANCE

2.4 COUNSELING

Because personal concerns of students can seriously limit educational development, school personnel shall provide a counseling and guidance program and make relevant information available to students.¹

2.4.2. Granted time for scheduled counseling appointments when such appointments will not seriously interfere with class work.	Schedule counseling appointments in advance unless the problem is an emergency.

2.5 PROMOTION OR RETENTION (K-6)

Students thrive best when placed in or promoted to grade levels with other students who have compatible age, physical, social, and emotional status. Students who demonstrate reasonable effort to meet grade-level expectations, commensurate with their ability and rate of learning should be promoted. Those students who do not demonstrate reasonable effort should be retained.²

2.6 GRADES AND/OR CREDIT

An academic grade should reflect the teacher's objective assessment of a student's achievement. Therefore, academic grades <u>should not</u> be used to maintain order in a classroom. Neither should student behavior be included as a negative factor in calculating such grades.

2.7 DRESS AND GROOMING

One of the fundamental purposes of school is to provide the foundation for creation and development of a proper attitude toward education. To further this purpose, it is essential to create and maintain an effective teaching and learning environment. Student attire impacts the teaching and learning environment as well as the responses of others toward them. Clothing can either promote an effective educational environment, or it can disrupt the educational climate and process. Student dress and grooming remain the primary responsibility of the student and his/her parents or guardians. However, dress or grooming that disrupts the learning process or endangers the health or safety of the school community shall become a disciplinary matter.¹

STUDENT RIGHTS

Each student has the right to:

- 2.7.1. Be informed of the school dress and grooming code at the beginning of each school year.
- 2.7.2. Wear clothes of their choice as long as those clothes are appropriate for school, <u>are not</u> dangerous to health, safety, or morals, and <u>do not</u> create a substantial and material disruption to the educational climate.
- 2.7.3. Appeal judgments of inappropriate dress and/or grooming.

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

Each student has the responsibility to:

- 2.7.4. Keep dress and grooming clean, healthy, sanitary, and safe.
- 2.7.5. Exercise sound judgment based upon the standard of appropriateness for the school setting.
- 2.7.6. Follow dress and grooming standards established by school authorities for participating in school activities.
- 2.7.7. Wear items of apparel (clothing, cosmetics, tattoos, jewelry) that <u>do not</u> disrupt the favorable learning atmosphere or decorum of the school. The following <u>are not acceptable</u>:
 - a. See-through clothing or clothing that depicts see-through clothing.
 - b. Clothing that exposes undergarments or that portrays exposure of undergarments.
 - c. Clothing that permits excessive exposure of bare skin (including but <u>not limited to</u>: shorts, short skirts, bare midriffs, bare backs, off the shoulder shirts or blouses, spaghetti straps, strapless garments, tank tops, revealing necklines that expose excessive cleavage, etc.).
 - d. Excessively tight or revealing clothing (tights worn as outerwear, spandex, bathing/swimming wear, sleep wear, etc.).
 - e. Clothing that depicts or alludes to, by color, picture, symbol, or word:
 - alcohol or tobacco;
 - drugs or controlled substances;
 - drug paraphernalia;
 - · gangs;
 - · violence:
 - sexually explicit, lewd, profane, vulgar, indecent, suggestive, or offensive material; or
 - · illegal acts.
 - f. Wearing jewelry, emblems, badges, symbols, signs, codes, or other things that evidence membership or affiliation in any gang.²

2.7 DRESS AND GROOMING (continued)

STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

Each student has the responsibility to:

- 2.7.9. Not wear sunglasses to class or in the school building unless prescribed by a physician.
- 2.7.10. Always wear appropriate footwear.
- 2.7.11. Button shirts/blouses appropriately.
- 2.7.12. Zip zippers on pants and skirts.
- 2.7.13. Fasten belts worn with pants or shorts.
- 2.7.14. Understand that class entrance may be denied if dressed or adorned inappropriately.
- 2.7.15. Understand that all class time missed to change inappropriate attire will be deemed unexcused absences.
- 2.7.16. Understand that insubordination or refusal to change improper attire may result in suspension or expulsion.
- 2.7.17. Understand that repeated dress code violations may result in suspension or expulsion.

PARENT/GUARDIAN RIGHTS

Each parent/guardian has the right to:

2.7.18. Be notified each time their student is asked to change inappropriate attire or leave school because of inappropriate attire.

2.8 STUDENT DRIVING AND PARKING ON SCHOOL PREMISES

Regulations governing student travel to and from school in private vehicles are necessary to protect both drivers and non-drivers. Driving and parking on District property is not a right; it is a privilege that must be controlled in order to fulfill District accountability to parents and guardians and to control loiterers.

One of the important roles of the school is to provide opportunities for students to express themselves on a wide range of subjects.

PARENT/GUARDIAN RIGHTS

Each parent/guardian has the right to:

- 2.10.4 Inspect, copy, and challenge according to the appropriate guidelines all information contained in their minor child's records.¹
- 2.10.5 Withhold the release of their minor child's name, address, and telephone number to Idaho colleges and universities, United States Armed Forces Recruiting Agencies, and other authorized agencies by completing the District Opt-Out Form and returning it to the school each year. ²

2.11 PRIVACY AND PROPERTY RIGHTS

To facilitate a school climate that is conducive to learning, and that assures the safety and welfare of students and personnel, video surveillance on District property is authorized. School officials may search the person and personal property of individuals on school property or at any school sponsored activity regardless of location. Such searches may include facilities furnished to students by the District. Property deemed to be a threat to the safety and welfare of the school community may be seized if there is reason to believe that an illegal act or violation of school rules is being or is about to be committed.

2.12 SEARCH AND SEIZURE

To maintain order and security, school officials are authorized to conduct reasonable searches of school property and equipment as well as of students, their personal effects, and student vehicles parked on school property. The principal or his/her designee may request the assistance of law enforcement officials to conduct inspections and searches using specially trained dogs.¹

2.13 USE OF TECHNOLOGY

Internet access and interconnected computer systems are available to the District's students, faculty, and staff. Electronic networks, including the Internet, are a part of the District's instructional program to promote educational excellence by facilitating resource sharing, innovation, and communication. Use is a privilege, not a right. Students and staff have no expectation of privacy in any materials that are stored, transmitted, or received via the District's electronic network or District computers.² Students may have cellular phones in their possession so long as they <u>are not</u> used in a manner that is disruptive of the educational process.³

SECTION 3

RIGHT TO APPEAL UNFAIR PENALTIES

There may be times when students feel they have been unfairly penalized. When this is the case, they should follow policy #4112 <u>Uniform Grievance</u> to obtain a prompt and equitable solution at the lowest administrative level.

Most problems can be solved if a student will discuss the matter with the teacher or staff member who was involved. If a student feels uncomfortable with that person, he/she may request a conference with the next level of authority. The student or parents or guardians may also request the presence of a third party, such as a counselor, assistant principal, other staff person, translator, or interpreter. If discussing the matter does not resolve the matter, the student or his/her parent or guardian should submit a written statement, using the *Uniform Grievance Concern Form* #4112F1, to the building principal or his/her designee within the required timelines. The concern form should contain a statement of what happened, who was involved, and suggested solutions. The principal or his/her designee should respond using the *Uniform Grievance Response Form* #4112F2.

If the matter <u>is not</u> resolved with the principal or his/her designee, the student or his/her parent or guardian may, pursuant to policy #4112 timelines, request in writing that the Superintendent or his/her designee review the decision. The Superintendent's or his/her designee's decision shall be final for the appeal of any penalties that are fewer than ten (10) days. Parents or guardians may also appeal a disciplinary reassignment recommendation to the Superintendent or his/her designee within five (5) days of notification of such.

If the student or his/her parents or guardians believe that District policy <u>has not been</u> followed or the imposed penalty is ten (10) days or more, a written appeal may be made to the Board of Trustees. The decision of the Board will be final.

SECTION 4

DISCIPLINE

All students shall submit to the reasonable rules of the Bonneville Joint School District No. 93. Refusal to comply shall constitute sufficient cause for discipline, suspension, or expulsion.

Corporal Punishment

The District <u>does not</u> permit corporal punishment as a means for discipline. No teacher, other school employee, or administrator shall use physical force or physical contact against a student or strike a student as punishment for a violation of the <u>Code of Student Conduct</u>. This prohibition also extends to parents, guardians, or visitors on school grounds. However, a teacher, other school employee, or administrator shall be authorized to use reasonable and necessary physical force to restrain a student to protect one's self or other persons, prevent the destruction of property, or to prevent any illegal overt act on the part of a student.

Manifest Determination

If a student with disabilities violates the <u>Code of Student Conduct</u> and disciplinary action involves suspension, recommendation for expulsion, or other actions involving removal from a program for more than ten (10) days, the *Individual Education Plan* (IEP) team must meet to determine whether the

misconduct resulted from the disability. If the behavior is determined to be a manifestation of the disability, a functional behavioral assessment must be conducted and a behavior intervention plan either implemented or reviewed and modified to address the behavior. If this meeting determines the misconduct was not a result of the disability, the student can be suspended or expelled. Educational services can be terminated after an expulsion. When this happens, the principal or his/her designee should work with the IEP team to determine if alternative education programs can be put into place so that the student can continue his or her education.¹

Activity or Privilege Suspension

Violations of School Bus Safety Rules

The District Transportation Supervisor and school bus drivers, along with building principals or their designees will manage school bus safety rules violations. The principal/designee has the authority to take appropriate reasonable disciplinary action whenever a student poses an immediate safety hazard to the bus driver, other passengers, and/or passersby while transportation services are being provided. In addition, students may be suspended or expelled from attendance at school because of severe misbehavior on a school bus or other public conveyance.

Suspension or Exclusion from Extracurricular or Co-Curricular Activities

A student will be immediately suspended from all extracurricular and co-curricular activities when he/she receives a suspension (not including an in-school detention) from school for any reason.² Violation of this Code may cause further disciplinary action from the coach or adviser.³ Any display of unsportsmanlike conduct toward an opponent or official, or the use of profanity, vulgarity, or lewd or obscene comments or gestures is prohibited while participating in a practice, a contest, or a performance. Such actions will result in counseling by the head coach or advisor and/or school administrator. A possible suspension from the extracurricular or co-curricular activity may result up to and including the remainder of the season or duration of the activity in that scholastic year. Such suspension will only be from the activity where the violation occurred.⁴ Students may be required to sign and comply with a behavior contract before being reinstated to active participation.

A student may be suspended from extracurricular and co-curricular activities for a period of time up to and including the remainder of his/her attendance in the District when he/she has been knowingly present, commits a **Level 4 Violation** of this Code, has been arrested, or it reasonably appears to the District that he/she has violated criminal law (other than infractions or minor traffic violations).⁵

If an investigation discloses that a student knowingly or in a malicious manner falsely accused another, he/she may be excluded from any form of extracurricular or co-curricular activity for a period of time up to and including the remainder of his/her attendance in the District.⁶

REPORTING DISCRIMINATION AND/OR SEXUAL HARASSMENT, INTIMIDATION, BULLYING, CYBER BULLING, HAZING, OR MENACING OFFENSES

Students who believe they have been discriminated against, or a victim of sexual harassment, intimidation, bullying, cyber bullying, hazing, harassment, or menacing should contact a counselor, teacher, administrator, or Title IX coordinator (Assistant Superintendent, who is the District's appointed Nondiscrimination Coordinator - 208-525-4400), who will assist them in the complaint process.

Information may be reported anonymously by completing the Harassment Reporting Form #3290F² and delivering it to a teacher, counselor, administrator, or District Title IX coordinator. Students should understand however, that an anonymous report will be much more difficult to investigate.

SECTION 6

LEVELS OF OFFENSES, LABELING OF RULE VIOLATIONS, AND INTERVENTIONS

Levels of Offenses

This Code divides violations into four levels. The level of offense dictates the severity of the remedial measure imposed. Interventions will generally become progressively more severe if rule infractions persist. However, the teacher or principal or his/her designee may move to the most severe penalty at any time based on the circumstances involved in an incident and the disciplinary history of the student. The principal or his/her designee may also reduce disciplinary sanctions when warranted.

Before determining the appropriate remedial measure to impose, the student's explanation shall be heard along with further consultation with school personnel, if necessary. However, the determination of sanctions shall be at the sole discretion of the principal or his/her designee pursuant to applicable law and District policy. No student shall be expelled, suspended, or disciplined in any manner for any act not related to the orderly operation of the school or school-sponsored activities or any aspect of the educational process.

Level 1 Violations

Level 1 violations are those infractions that are minor in nature and should be managed by the classroom teacher. Each teacher will manage classroom disruptions using in-class disciplinary action as well as student conferences, contacting parents or guardians, asking the parents or guardians to shadow the student, and/or conferring with other school staff. Students should only be referred to the principal or his/her designee for formal disciplinary action when interventions by the teacher have been ineffective or the disruption sufficiently severe.

Level 2 Violations

Level 2 violations are those infractions that are more disruptive and require removal of a student from the classroom or activity when it has been documented that the behavior has seriously disrupted the educational environment. These are managed by the principal or his/her designee in consultation with the student's parents or guardians when necessary and generally result in the student serving in-school

detention, after-school detention, before-school detention, or Saturday School. If parents or guardians agree, students can be assigned a work detail at the school. Detention and work assignments will be under the supervision of a staff member. Parents or guardians will be notified prior to a student serving after-school or before-school detention¹ and will be informed of the date and time at least two school days in advance of Saturday School.²

The student may be temporarily suspended if rule infractions at this level persist. The following may be considered before deciding to suspend:

- Has the student been sent to the principal or his/her designee at least once before?
- Have parents or guardians been informed that the behavior is a problem and that the student may be suspended?
- Has the student been referred to a guidance counselor?
- Has the student been given a work assignment before?
- Has the student been referred to an outside agency for assistance?

Level 3 Violations

Level 3 violations are major infractions managed by the principal or his/her designee and generally give rise to in-school suspension, out of school suspension, or disciplinary reassignment of the student. The student may be placed in an alternative education program or recommended for expulsion at the discretion of the principal after consultation with the Superintendent or his/her designee.

Level 4 Violations

Level 4 violations are severe infractions managed by the principal or his/her designee and law enforcement agencies. Students will be suspended and recommended to the Board of Trustees for expulsion. If a student commits an offense that causes critical human injury, extensive property damage, or excessive school disruption, the Board may decide <u>not to allow</u> her/him to attend any school in the District, including Lincoln Alternative High School, Bonneville Technical Careers High School, District 93 eCenter, Bonneville Online Elementary School or Bonneville Online High School. Referrals to community resources may be made. If a student is expelled during the last semester of his/her senior year, he/she <u>will not</u> be allowed to participate in the graduation ceremony.³

Labeling Rule Violations

This Code separates violations at each level into two divisions: (1) **Elementary** and (2) **Secondary**. Rule violations are labeled by using **E** for elementary students followed by a **1**, **2**, **3**, **or 4** to indicate the level and then the **number** of the rule that was violated (such as E1:2 – Elementary level 1: Rule 2); or **S** for secondary students followed by a **1**, **2**, **3 or 4** to indicate the level and then the **number** of the rule that was violated (such as S1:2 – Secondary level 1: Rule 2). A rule violation may be placed at one level for elementary students and at a different level for secondary students or it may be placed at the same level for both. Placement of a rule at a certain level will depend on the perceived ability of students to understand or cause harm or damage.

Examples:

The Same Rule Listed at Different Levels

E2:12 means the violation is in the **Elementary** division under **Level 2** (Violations resulting in detention) and the rule that was violated is **Rule 12**: Assault toward School Personnel.

S3:12 means the violation is in the **Secondary** division under **Level 3** (Violations resulting in suspension) and the rule that was violated is **Rule 12:** Assault toward School Personnel.

The Same Rule Listed at the Same Level

E4:69 means the violation is in the **Elementary** division under **Level 4** (Violations resulting in recommendation to the Board for expulsion) and the rule that was violated is **Rule 69**: *Possession or Use of Firearms*.

S4:69 means the violation is in the **Secondary** division under **Level 4** (Violations resulting in recommendation to the Board for expulsion) and the rule that was violated is **Rule 69**: *Possession or Use of Firearms*.

The tables in Section 7 suggest interventions or disciplinary actions at each level for elementary and secondary students that may be followed by the principal or his/her designee.

SECTION 7

CODE OF STUDENT CONDUCT RULES

The following is a list of rules describing possible student misconduct. In addition to specific offenses set forth, the District has the right to discipline any student who engages in conduct that is not listed, but threatens the health, safety, or welfare of others or disrupts the learning environment.

ARSON

Rule 1: Arson

1.1 The willful and deliberate burning of, or attempting to burn, school property.

ATTENDANCE

Rule 2: Tardiness

2.1 Not in the assigned classroom when the bell rings.

- 3.1 Absent from school or class in excess of six (6) days during a grading period (K-8 students).
- 3.2 Absent from school or class in excess of six (6) days during a grading period (9-12 students).
- 3.3 Absent without prior approval of the student's parent or guardian.
- 3.4 Departure from school or class during the school day without the permission of the principal or his/her designee and without checking out through the office or attendance office.
- 3.5 Missing class with parental/quardian permission and remaining on school grounds.
- 3.6 Any child whose parents or guardians have failed or refused to cause such child to be instructed as provided in Idaho Code 33-202.

CHEATING

Rule 5: Cheating/Plagiarism

- 5.1 Misleading, breaking rules, deceiving, or acting dishonestly on purpose on any school premises or at any school sponsored activity, regardless of location.
- 5.2 Plagiarizing in whole or in part assignments, research papers, compositions, projects, etc.

DISRESPECT

Rule 6: Insubordination – Failure or Refusal to follow School Rules and Regulations and/or Reasonable Directives of School Staff

- 6.1 Refusal to stop, provide name, and/or other information when asked to do so by school personnel.
- 6.2 Failure or refusal to obey school rules.
- 6.3 Failure or refusal to obey legal directives from teachers, administrators, instructional aides, bus drivers, or any other authorized District employee.
- 6.4 Failing or refusing to serve detention or in-school suspension when directed to do so by the principal or his/her designee or other authorized school personnel.
- 6.5 Failing to serve Level 1 sanctions when directed to do so by the principal or his/her designee or other authorized school personnel.

DISORDERLY CONDUCT

Rule 9: Gambling

9.1 Playing a game of chance for something of tangible value on a school campus, a school bus, during the school day, or during a school related activity unless approved by school administration.

Rule 10: Conspiracy

10.1 Any two (2) or more persons mutually agreeing to do any unlawful act.

Rule 11: Endangerment

12.1 The use of violent, abusive, or obscene language or gestures addressed to teacher or other District personnel in a threatening manner.

- 16.3 When a deadly weapon or other instrument is used to inflict bodily injury on a person that requires medical treatment, including but <u>not limited to</u>: treatment for bone fractures, cuts requiring stitches, disfigurement, dislocations, or any similar or more serious injury.

- 21.4 Visual acts (graffiti, slogans, or visual displays such as cartoons or posters depicting derogatory sentiments);
- 21.5 Criminal acts (acts in violation of Idaho Code, Federal Criminal Codes, or Idaho or Federal Human Rights Commission Code).
- 21.6 Falsely accusing another of harassment or intimidation.
- 21.7 Retaliating against an individual who in good faith reports, associates with the individual reporting, participates in the investigation, or investigates alleged harassment.

- 22.5 Acts sufficiently severe, persistent, or pervasive that it creates an intimidating, threatening, or abusive educational environment.
- 22.6 Conduct that has the effect of humiliation, embarrassment, or discomfort.
- 22.7 Expressing or using threats against another person or being annoying, dangerous, or harmful.

22.8 Retaliating against an individual who in good faith reports, associates with the individual reporting, participates in the investigation, or investigates alleged bullying.

- 26.2 Rape or sexual battery.
- 26.3 Lewd and lascivious act on a student under 16 years of age.
- 26.4 Possession of a concealed weapon.
- 26.5 Armed robbery.
- 26.6 Sale of illegal drugs.
- 26.7 Possession of a bomb.
- 26.8 Any felony involving the use of a firearm.
- 26.9 Battery on a school employee or official.
- 26.10 Aggravated battery.

- 27.7 Presents a clear and present likelihood that it will cause a material and substantial disruption of the school or school activities;
- 27.8 Presents a clear and present likelihood that it will cause the commission of unlawful acts;
- 27.9 Presents a clear and present likelihood that it will cause the violation of lawful school regulations.

- 28.6 Coercing a student or staff member to accept any publication.

SECTION 9

Definitions

Activity Suspension or Suspension from Extracurricular or Co-Curricular Activities: Is a suspension where students <u>are not</u> allowed to travel, dress in uniform, associate, or participate with the team or group at scheduled events.

Suspended students may be allowed to participate in practices or meetings if deemed appropriate by the principal or designee.

Administrative Hearing: A hearing conducted by an administrator appointed by the Superintendent and/or Board of Trustees.

After-School Detention: Assignment of a student to a designated room on campus at the end of the regular school day for a specified period of time. Parents or guardians must arrange for the student's transportation home.

Age of Compulsory Attendance: Ages seven (7) through sixteen (16).

Alcoholic Beverage: Any beverage that contains alcohol.

Alert: A predetermined change of a detection dog's behavior, which is recognized by the canine handler as indicating the presence of the odor of the suspected substance.

Alternative School Placement: A school or program placement that is focused on improving student behavior, attendance, and academic performance.

Assault: An unlawful attempt or intentional unlawful threat by word or act to inflict violent injury upon another person, when coupled with an apparent ability to do so, and any act that creates a well-founded fear in such other person that such violence is imminent (Idaho Code §18-901 Assault defined).

 An assault may be committed without touching,-striking, or doing bodily harm to another person.

Battery: Any unlawful touching of another person.

Board of Trustees: Refers to the governing body of the District composed of five elected representatives. The Board of Trustees sets District policy and acts as the final appeal panel for prolonged suspensions and expulsions.

Bullying: Pursuant to Idaho Code §18-917A Student harassment – Intimidation - Bullying, bullying behavior is any:

- Intentional gesture, or
- Intentional written, verbal, or physical act or threat by a student that a reasonable person under the circumstances should know will have the effect of:
 - harming a student;
 - damaging a student's property;
 - placing a student in reasonable fear of harm to his or her person; or
 - placing a student in reasonable fear of damage to his or her property.
- Act sufficiently severe, persistent, or pervasive that it creates an intimidating, threatening, or abusive educational environment for a student.

Bullying can be committed using:

- A landline, smart phone, or cellular phone; or
- Data or computer software that is accessed through a computer, computer system, or computer network.

A student who personally violates any provision of Idaho Code 18-917A may be guilty of an infraction.

Cheating: When a person misleads, breaks rules, deceives, or acts dishonestly on purpose. Cheating creates an unfair advantage that is usually in one's own interest, and often is at the expense of others. Plagiarism is a form of cheating.

Chemical Involvement: Whenever a student has consumed or is under the influence of drugs or alcohol.

Club: A sponsored club, sports club, or a nonsponsored or non-curriculum club of students in the school who wish to organize and meet to form common goals, objectives, or purposes, but does not include school activities.

Cyber-Bullying: includes but is not limited to the following misuses of technology (computers, electronic communication devices, the Internet, pagers, etc.): harassing, teasing, intimidating, threatening, or terrorizing another person by sending inappropriate and hurtful e-mail messages, instant messages, text messages, digital pictures or images, sexting, website postings, and blogs through use of the District's computer network or the Internet, whether accessed on campus or off campus, during or after school hours.

Code: Shall mean this Code of Student Conduct.

Co-curricular Activities: Are held outside the regular school day but are integral to the classroom as part of the stated curriculum. Such activities include but are <u>not limited to</u>: Idaho High Schools Activities Association (IHSAA) sanctioned Speech Arts, Spirit, and Music activities.

Contraband: Is any illegal or prohibited property, the possession of which is forbidden under school policy or illegal under federal or state laws. Contraband shall consist of, but is not limited to: weapons, stolen property, pornography, alcohol, tobacco, nicotine innovations, illicit drugs, prescription or nonprescription drugs designed to alter the feeling or behavior of an individual, or drugs or substances that appear to be any of the above.

Controlled Substances: Shall include, but are not limited to: opiates, opium derivatives, hallucinogenic, depressant or stimulant substances, including cocaine, cannabis and synthetic equivalents of the substances contained in the plant; any material, compound, mixture, or preparation with substances having a depressant effect on the central nervous system.

Corporal Punishment: Physically punishing a student. Corporal Punishment <u>does not</u> include teachers' and school authorities' use of force (1)

to quell a disturbance; (2) to obtain possession of weapons or other dangerous objects; (3) for the purpose of self-defense; or (4) for the protection of a person or property.

Dangerous Objects/Instruments: Anything that, although <u>not</u> specifically designed to hurt someone, is used to cause injury or to put someone in fear. Examples may include belts, scissors, combs, writing utensils, compasses, chains, etc. Such items should be considered dangerous instruments when they are used to cause injury or to put someone in fear.

Dangerous Weapon: a weapon, device, instrument, material, or substance, animate or inanimate, that is used for, or is readily capable of causing death or serious bodily injury, except that such term does not include a pocket knife with a blade of less than 2½ inches in length as defined in 18 United States Code (U.S.C.) Section 930.

Disability: A physical or mental impairment that (1) substantially limits one or more of the major life activities of an individual; (2) a record of such an impairment; or being regarded as having such an impairment; or (3) a specific disability such as: multiple disabilities, autism, intellectual disability, specific learning disability, hearing impairment, speech or language impairment, visual impairment, serious emotional disturbance, orthopedic impairment, traumatic brain injury, or other health impairment.

Destructive Device: Pursuant to 26 U.S.C. § 5845(f) a destructive device is defined as follows:

- Any explosive, incendiary, or poison gas including but not limited to:
 - bombs;
 - grenades;
 - non-hobby rockets having a propellant charge of more than four (4) ounces;
 - missiles having an explosive or incendiary charge of more than onequarter (¼) ounce;
 - mines;
 - fireworks; or

- > similar devices.
- Any type of weapon that will, or may be readily converted to, expel a projectile by the action of an explosive or other propellant, and that has any barrel with a bore of more than one-half (½) inch in diameter except a shotgun or shotgun shell that is generally recognized as particularly suitable for sporting purposes; and
- Any combination of parts either designed or intended for use in converting any device into a destructive device as defined above and from which a destructive device may be readily assembled.
- A destructive device shall not include:
 - an antique firearm;
 - a rifle or shotgun that the owner intends to use solely for sporting, recreational, or cultural purposes; or
 - any device that <u>is not</u> designed or redesigned for use as a weapon.

Detention: For minor infractions of school rules or regulations, or for minor misconduct, school officials may detain students in school, before school, or after school. Students may also be required to attend Saturday school for up to four (4) hours.

- After-School Detention: Assignment to a
 designated room on campus at the end of
 the regular school day for a specified period
 of time. Parents or guardians must arrange
 for the student's transportation home.
- Before-School Detention: Assignment to a designated room on campus for a specified period before school. Parents or guardians must arrange for the student's transportation to school.
- In-School Detention: The student remains in school, isolated from peers, and assigned to designated rooms or programs. The student is considered present in school for attendance purposes. Make-up work is allowed.

Saturday School: Supervised detention that is assigned by a school administrator where a student is required to attend school on Saturday or other non-school days. Students will be required to work on school assignments or complete work assignments to evaluate their behavior. Parents or guardians must arrange for the student's transportation.

Discipline: Constitutes forms of corrective action or punishment, that include brief exclusions from a class for not more than the remainder of the class period and exclusion from any other type of activity conducted by or for the District. Discipline shall not adversely affect a specific academic grade, subject, or graduation requirements, if all required work is performed pursuant to District policy.

Disciplinary Reassignment: If the principal or his/her designee determines that removal from the regular school program is in the best interest of the student, the student will be suspended for five (5) school days and requested to attend an alternative school within the District (such as Bonneville Online Elementary School, Bonneville Online High School, Lincoln Alternative High School, District 93 eCenter, Bonneville Technical Careers High School, Behavioral Health Alternative, etc.).

The principal or his/her designee must recommend transfer in writing and provide parents or guardians with a copy of the recommendation. The Superintendent or his/her designee may extend the suspension for an additional ten (10) school days to accommodate reassignment procedures.

Disruptive Conduct: Includes, but is <u>not limited</u> to:

- Any conduct intended to, or having the effect of, obstructing, disrupting, or interfering with teaching, service, administrative disciplinary functions, or any school sponsored activity;
- Physical abuse or threat of harm to any person;
- Sexual harassment of any person; or

 Forceful or unauthorized entry to or occupation of school facilities or the facilities of an authorized school activity.

Distribution: To share and/or sell alcohol, drugs, tobacco products, nicotine innovations, or any controlled or dangerous substance to other students or persons.

District/School District: Shall mean the Bonneville Joint School District No. 93, Idaho Falls, Idaho.

District Official: Includes, but is <u>not limited to</u>: teacher, school counselor, school nurse, principal, assistant principal, or another District administrator.

District Premises: Shall include but is <u>not</u> <u>limited to</u>: buildings, facilities and grounds on the school campuses, school busses, properties leased by the District, and school parking areas.

Drugs: Shall include any alcohol or malt beverage, illegal inhalant, tobacco product, nicotine innovations, controlled substance, illegal substance, abused substance, look-alike or counterfeit drug, medication <u>not</u> approved and registered by the school authorities, substance intended to alter mood, and/or substance that is misrepresented and sold or distributed as a restricted or illegal drug.

Drug Free Zone: The area on or within one thousand (1,000) feet of school property.

Drug Paraphernalia: All equipment, products, and materials that are used, intended for use, or designed for use, in planting, propagating, cultivating, growing, harvesting, manufacturing, compounding, converting, producing, processing, preparing, testing, analyzing, packaging, repackaging, storing, containing, concealing; or injecting, ingesting, inhaling, smoking, or otherwise introducing into the human body a controlled substance.

Electronic Communication Devices: may include, but not be limited to, smart phones, cellular telephones, pagers/beepers, laptops, tablets, e-readers, or other related electronic devices.

Emergency: Any event that threatens the safety and security of students, staff, or visitors.

Emergency Activity Suspension: An activity suspension imposed by the principal/designee prior to an informal hearing regarding the reasons for the suspension and the opportunity to challenge those reasons when it is necessary to protect the health and safety of the individual(s) involved and immediate action is appropriate.

Emergency Suspension: A suspension imposed by the principal/designee prior to an informal hearing regarding the reasons for the suspension and the opportunity to challenge those reasons when it is necessary to protect the health and safety of the individual(s) involved and immediate action is appropriate.

Event: A performance, match, game, meet, or other competition including regional, state, and/or national tournaments or competitions.

Excused Absence: Is an absence from school with the knowledge and approval of the student's parent or guardian. Such absences are counted toward the maximum number of absences allowed per grading period.

Expulsion: The removal or exclusion of a student from the immediate supervision and control of school beyond the balance of the school semester. Only the Board of Trustees has the authority to expel or deny enrollment to any student. Students who are expelled <u>cannot</u> attend any Bonneville Joint School District No. 93 school except as allowed by the Board. Any student who is expelled is prohibited admission to any school premises or to any school sponsored activity, regardless of location

Extracurricular Activities: Are held outside the regular school day. These include IHSAA sanctioned athletics and activities. Although many of these activities involve travel or participation during school time, the basis of the organization for meeting and practice is held outside of the school timetable.

Firearm:

- Any weapon (including an athletic event starter gun) that will or is designed to or may readily be converted to expel a projectile by the action of an explosive;
- The frame or receiver of any such weapon;

- Any firearm muffler or silencer; or
- Any destructive device including any explosive, incendiary or poisonous gas bombs, grenades, rocket, missile, mine, or similar devices as defined in 18 U.S.C. Section 921.

Fraternity, Sorority, or Secret Society: Any organization where active membership is comprised, in whole or in part, of pupils enrolled in the District, and that exists or perpetuates itself wholly or partly by selecting members on the basis of the decision of its membership rather than upon the basis of the right of any pupil, qualified by the rules and regulations of the school, to be a member. Exceptions include Boy Scouts of America, Girl Scouts of America, Campfire Girls, DeMolay, YMCA, and similar organizations.

Gang: Any ongoing organization, association, or group of three (3) or more people, whether formal or informal, that has a common name or common identifying sign or symbol, and whose members individually or collectively advocate, conspire, or commit:

- Any criminal act(s); or
- Any acts that threaten the safety or wellbeing of property or persons, including, but not limited to: harassment and intimidation (Idaho Code §18-85 Criminal Gang Enforcement Act).

Grand Theft: Any theft where the property is obtained by extortion committed by instilling in the victim a fear of physical injury to some person, damage to property, or use or abuse of position as a public servant to affect some person adversely.

- The value of the property taken exceeds one thousand dollars (\$1,000).
- The property consists of a public record.
- The property is taken from the person of another.
- The property is obtained by extortion. (Idaho Code §18-2407)

Habitual Truant: Any pupil with three (3) truancies in a grading period or four (4) truancies over the three (3) year period of grades seven (7) through nine (9) or grades ten (10) through twelve (12) (Policy #3050 <u>Attendance</u>).

Any child whose parents or guardians, have failed or refused to cause such child to be instructed as provided in Idaho Code 33-202 (Idaho Code §33-206).

Harmful to Minors: Any picture, image, graphic image file, or other depiction (text, audio, or video) that:

- Appeals to a prurient interest in nudity, sex, or excretion;
- Depicts, describes, or represents, in a patently offensive way an actual or simulated:
 - sexual act or sexual contact defined in <u>Section 2246 of Title 18, United States</u> Code,
 - > normal or perverted sexual acts; or
 - > a lewd exhibition of the genitals;
- Lacks serious literary, artistic, political, or scientific value as to minors; or
- Would endorse or promote any of the following:
 - > abusive or threatening material;
 - alcohol, tobacco, nicotine innovations, and drug use or abuse;
 - gambling;
 - hate/discrimination materials;
 - murder/suicide material;
 - racially offensive material;
 - > school cheating information; or
 - violence, and weapons.

Harassment: Any verbal, written, graphic, or physical conduct by an individual or group that is sufficiently severe, persistent, pervasive, and offensive to:

- Substantially and systemically undermine, disrupt, detract from, interfere with, or limit the ability of an individual to participate in or benefit from the District's programs, activities, or resources;
- Create an intimidating, hostile, threatening, or abusive educational or work environment;
- Substantially or unreasonably interfere with a person's performance; or
- Adversely affect a person's educational or work opportunities.

Actions that may constitute harassment include, but are not limited to:

- Physical acts (i.e. aggression or assault, battery, damage to property, intimidation, vandalism, or implied or overt threats of violence);
- Verbal acts (i.e. demeaning jokes, taunting, intimidation, hate speech, slurs, derogatory nicknaming, innuendoes, or other negative remarks);
- Written acts (i.e. letters or other hard copy communications and email or text messages that contain demeaning, taunting, intimidating language, or hate speech, slurs, derogatory nicknaming, innuendoes, or other negative remarks);
- Visual acts (i.e. graffiti, slogans, or visual displays such as cartoons or posters depicting derogatory sentiments); or
- Criminal acts (i.e. acts in violation of Idaho or Federal Criminal Codes or Idaho Federal Human Rights Commission Code).

Hazardous Material: Includes any substance or mixture of substances that poses a fire, explosive, reactive, or health hazard.

Hazing: To subject a person to bodily danger, physical harm, severe emotional harm, extreme embarrassment, or personal degradation; to

subject a person to the likelihood of any of the above.

- To require, encourage, authorize or permit a person to be subjected to any of the following:
 - > Total or substantial nudity on the part of the person;
 - > Compelled ingestion of any substance;
 - Wearing or carrying of any obscene or physically burdensome article;
 - Physical assaults upon or offensive physical contact;
 - > Transportation and abandonment;
 - Confinement to unreasonably small, unventilated, unsanitary, or unlighted areas;
 - Sleep deprivation;
 - > Assignment to perform pranks;
 - Any forced activity that could adversely affect the mental or physical health or safety of the person; or
 - Any other activities intended to degrade or humiliate.
- Hazing does not include customary athletic events or activities or similar contests or competitions and is limited to those actions taken and situations created in connection with initiation into or affiliation with any group or organization.
- Hazing does not include corporal punishment administered by officials or employees of the District when such actions are pursuant to <u>Corporal Punishment</u> Policy #3345.
- Any activity described herein as hazing shall be presumed to be "forced" activity, the willingness of an individual to participate in such activity notwithstanding.

IEP: Shall mean an *Individual Education Plan* to support a student with disabilities who requires specially designed instruction and related services.

Infraction: a civil public offense, not constituting a crime, which is punishable only by a penalty not exceeding three hundred dollars (\$300) and for which no period of incarceration may be imposed.

Intimidation: includes, but is not limited to, any threat or act intended to:

- Tamper, substantially damage, or interfere with another's property;
- Cause substantial inconvenience;
- Subject another to offensive physical contact, or
- Inflict serious physical injury based on race, color, religion, national origin or sexual orientation.

Intimidating, Hostile, and Offensive: Includes conduct that has the effect of humiliation, embarrassment, or discomfort.

Knowingly Present: Shall mean that a student attended a gathering of two (2) or more individuals where one (1) or more of the attendees (other than the student at issue) were using or in possession of drug paraphernalia, controlled substances, drugs, alcohol, or tobacco, nicotine innovations, and the student knew or reasonably should have known that such use or possession was occurring.

LCA: Loss of credit due to attendance. When a high school student has exceeded the limit of absent days allowed in any class during the grading period.

Look Alike Weapons: Objects that closely resemble a weapon or explosive and could put persons in fear of their safety. Examples include toy guns, smoke bombs, etc.

Manifestation Determination: A review of a special education student's program and disability to determine if misconduct is related to the disability.

MDT: Multi-disciplinary team composed of persons knowledgeable about the student's school history and individual needs, the meaning of evaluation data, and placement options.

Member of the School Community: Any student, parent/guardian, teacher, administrator, or employee of the District or visitor at any school.

Menacing: Means to express or use threats against another person or to be annoying, dangerous, or harmful to another or to cause a fear of imminent serious physical injury.

Nicotine Innovation: a device such as electronic vapor cigarettes, e-cigarettes, or another device that is meant to satisfy the smoker's oral fixation as well as deliver nicotine to the bloodstream.

No Tolerance: Means that consequences will occur if provisions of District policy and this Code are violated, and that the consequences will be commensurate with the circumstances of each situation.

On Any School Premises or at Any School Sponsored Activity, Regardless of Location: Shall include, but not be limited to buildings, facilities, and grounds on the school campus, school buses, school parking areas; and the location of any school sponsored activity. This includes instances where the conduct occurs off the school premises but impacts a school related activity.

Paraphernalia: Any object being used in the consumption, production, sale, or distribution of a controlled or illegal substance.

Parent/Guardian Shadow Student: The parent or guardian attends classes with the student for a specific amount of time.

Petit Theft: Taking personal property through fraud or stealth with the intent to deprive another of it permanently (where the value of property is under \$200).

Plagiarism: An act of fraud committed by submitting or presenting someone else's work as if it is your own work. It includes the use or close imitation of the language and thoughts of another author and representing them as your own original work.

Possession: To have drugs, tobacco products, nicotine innovations, and/or alcohol on a student's person or within an area of the student's control (including but not limited to: car,

locker, books, desks, and clothing) on or near school premises any time during school hours or at a school-sponsored activity regardless of location.

Reasonable Grounds to Suspect: More than a generalized suspicion or a mere hunch, but <u>not</u> requiring certainty that a violation has occurred. It may be based upon direct observations or the reported observations or experiences of others. It involves common-sense conclusion about human behavior based upon all the circumstances presented.

Reasonable Suspicion: An act of judgment by a District employee that leads to a reasonable and prudent belief that a student is in violation of the *Code of Student Conduct*. Said judgment shall be based on training in recognizing the signs and symptoms of drug, alcohol, tobacco, and nicotine innovation use.

 The fact that a student has previously disclosed use of a controlled substance <u>shall</u> <u>not</u> be deemed a factor in determining reasonable suspicion later.

Referral to Law Enforcement: A request for assistance regarding information gained through a person or event that reveals a student's possible involvement in illegal activities.

Riot: A public disturbance where a group of angry people become noisy and out of control, often damaging property and acting violently. In law, a riot is typically defined as a group of three (3) or more persons disturbing the peace for private purposes.

Saturday School: Makeup time on Saturdays where students who have excessive absences will be required to work on school assignments.

School: Any school in the Bonneville Joint School District No. 93.

School Board Hearing: A hearing by the Board of Trustees with the parent or guardian, student, and school personnel where all are given an opportunity to speak.

School Bus Suspension: Denial of the privilege of riding a school bus based on misconduct occurring while the student was transported at public expense.

School Days: Those days when school is in session.

School District Employee: Any individual hired by the Board of Trustees for work on either a part-time or full-time basis.

School Premises: Any property owned or utilized by the District or property utilized by any vendor under contract with the District. Includes but is <u>not limited to</u>: buildings, facilities, and grounds on the school campus, school buses, school bus stops, school parking areas, and any facility being used for a school function.

School Privileges: Any school-related activity or program including but <u>not limited to</u>: graduation ceremonies, class trips, dances, extracurricular or co-curricular activities, clubs, riding a bus, driving and parking on school property, or recesses.

Search: A physical examination of a person's property or self for discovering contraband. A search is permissible in the school setting, including school sponsored activities and events, where a school official has reasonable suspicion based on the totality of the circumstances, for believing that the search will reveal evidence that the student has violated either the law, District policy, or the rules of the school.

Serious Bodily Injury: Injury that creates a substantial risk of death or causes serious, permanent disfigurement, or loss or impairment of the function of any bodily member or organ.

Sexting: The sharing of sexually explicit photos, videos, Email, text, or chat via cell phone or the Internet.

Sexual Harassment: Includes, but is <u>not limited</u> <u>to</u>: unwelcome touching, crude jokes or pictures, discussions of sexual experiences, pressure for sexual activity, intimidation by words, actions, insults, or name calling, teasing related to sexual characteristics, and spreading rumors related to a person's alleged sexual activities.

 Unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature, comments, sexual name calling, gestures, and profanity.

Stalking: Willful, malicious, and repeated following or harassing another person or a member of that person's immediate family.

 A pattern of conduct composed of a series of acts over a period to time directed at a specific person that seriously alarms, annoys, or harasses the person, and which serves no legitimate purpose.

Student: Means any individual (preschool through twelfth grade) that is full-time, part-time, or dually enrolled in any school facility or program of Bonneville Joint School District No. 93.

Suspension: Involuntary removal of a student from the regular classroom environment.

- In-School Suspension: The student remains in school, isolated from peers and is considered present in school for attendance purposes. Make-up work along with credit for such work is allowed.
- Out-of-School Suspension: The student is supervised by a family member at home. A suspended student will not be counted as truant but is considered absent for attendance purposes and make-up work will be allowed.
 - Temporary Suspension: Is the exclusion from school or individual classes for a specific period up to five (5) school days. Principals/ designees are authorized to temporarily suspend.
 - Extended Temporary Suspension: Is an extension of an initial temporary suspension for up to an additional ten (10) school days. Only the Superintendent/designee or the Board of Trustees has the authority to impose an extended temporary suspension.
 - Prolonged Temporary Suspension: Is the addition of up to five (5) school days to an extended temporary suspension.

Only the Board of Trustees can prolong a suspension and only upon a finding that immediate return to school attendance by the temporarily suspended student would be detrimental to other pupils' health, welfare, or safety.

Supervised School Suspension: A student is required to attend school at the Supervised Suspension Center classroom.

Sweep: The use of a trained detection dog pursuant to a general inspection plan to detect the odor of contraband. A sweep is distinct from a search in that it is minimally intrusive to the individual and <u>does not</u> require reasonable suspicion because it <u>does not include</u> intrusion into areas or property that an individual has a reasonable expectation of privacy. However, the results of a sweep may generate the reasonable suspicion needed for a school official to execute a legal search.

Trespass: Shall mean the entrance onto school grounds when an individual has been prohibited.

Truancies: Absences without prior approval of the student's parent or guardian and includes departure from school or class during the school day without the permission of the principal/designee and without checking out through the attendance office.

 When a student misses class and remains on school grounds, parental/guardian permission does not validate the absence.

Weapon: Is defined in Section 92l of Title I8, United States Code and Section I8-3302D, Idaho Code and includes firearms, dirk knife, bowie knife, dagger, metal knuckles, and other deadly or dangerous weapons.

Work Assignments: Supervised activities for upkeep and maintenance of school facilities. Assignments <u>will not</u> disrupt a student's class schedule.
